#### With Gratitude

It has been a great run.

Eleven years has flown by, the longest I have ever served a congregation, and I am grateful for all that this generous season has held:

- ~ Grateful for the welcome of your middle school students and parents as their math teacher became their fellow worshiper...
  - ~ Grateful for the bonds we have made over the course of life's gifts and changes...
- ~ Grateful for the faithful ways we have navigated the challenges brought on as the world/economy/denomination/culture has dramatically shifted in unanticipated ways...
- ~ Grateful for your trust in welcoming me into the tender places life has taken you each and taken us all...

This time together has included laughter and tears, traditions and new creations. We celebrated the church's 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary, and we honored sacred endings and holy beginnings. We bid a sad farewell to a number of beloved things, such as the Preschool, the shower ministries, and the rummage sale; we continued a number of long-standing ministries, such as our support of SHIP and Family Promise and our Wednesday Lenten services; and we welcomed a number of new things, like the Open Mic Night, the knitting/crocheting groups, the Jefferson

School Easter Dinners and the Came to Believe service. We established chalkboard conversations and extended our bible study opportunities. We have baked bread and discussed movies and sculpted rocks and grieved and eaten and welcomed Flat Jesus and studied and cared for the earth and given and sang and prayed and hosted guests and tried to learn the rules of cricket and cared for our building and cared for one another and cared for the stranger in our midst...

And amid it all we have discerned and have been living into a call from God to be a source of renewal in the larger community.

You gave me permission to try things we had not tried before and you welcomed new voices into leadership across the life of the church. I am deeply grateful for your patience and encouragement on this journey, and am grateful for God's nudges along the way.

My last Sunday with you will be June 16<sup>th</sup>, and I will remain on call for all pastoral emergencies through June 30<sup>th</sup>. Lay Leader Beverly Alexis will preach on June 23<sup>rd</sup>, and the Rev. Gary Frieze will preach on June 30<sup>th</sup>. As of July 1st, the Rev. Christina Lelache will be your pastor, and I know you will welcome her with eagerness, joy, and love.

<u>In order for us to insure a healthy time of change, here are the Conference guidelines for pastoral transition:</u>

As of the effective date of a new appointment, a pastor shall immediately cease all pastoral counseling and pastoral visitation with members of member families in the previous appointment.

Pastors shall have a clear understanding with former congregations that they will not return to officiate at baptisms, weddings, and funerals, or do pastoral counseling or pastoral visitation in that parish. Pastors, active or retired, shall respectfully decline to participate in such duties when invited by members of a former congregation. Declining all such invitations is the responsibility of the previous pastor.

The District Superintendent must be consulted by the previous pastor in advance of any return for pastoral functions. Such visits to former church shall require the advance approval of the District Superintendent. The present pastor should never be under any pressure to invite the previous pastor. Pressure to involve the previous pastor should not be generated by either the congregation or the previous pastor.

Beloved friends, in keeping with the wisdom of these guidelines, I endeavor to do nothing that would interrupt, undermine, or impede the ministry of the pastor who follows me. To do so would potentially slow down the new pastor's connection with and participation in the lives of those to whom she now offers care. Out of my love for you I will honor the healthy boundaries we are given.

And so in this time of sacred transition, the most precious gifts I can offer are my commitments to continue to pray for you and to love you.

With gratitude and love to God and to you each, I bid you farewell.

#### 2019 GNJ Annual Conference Wrap Up

"They shall be like a tree planted by water, sending its roots by the stream." Jeremiah 17:8

United Methodists in Greater New Jersey demonstrated their leadership in the denomination, their love of Christ and their commitment to our mission to make disciples of Christ for the transformation of the world at the 2019 Session of Annual Conference.

#### **Episcopal Address**

In his opening address, Bishop John Schol celebrated the ministries of congregations in Greater New Jersey, sharing ways that clergy and congregational leaders have demonstrated their love through mission and outreach. He shared the good works of GNJ's vital mission partners who witness to our communities through mission, financial management, engaging young disciples and serving housing needs. In a personal and emotional witness to the state of the church, he shared his commitment to explore new expressions of Methodism in the wake of current disagreements over homosexuality. "Let me be clear, I am not interested in changing a few paragraphs in The Book of Discipline and then call it a day. The Gospel demands more of us, of me and of you as leaders of the church of Jesus Christ. God is ready to do new things through us and while it will not look the same, it will be Wesleyan, it will be connectional, it will be transformative and it will turn the church outward.

Bishop Schol called for 50 congregations to volunteer to pilot the next Methodism. He called for others to continue to move our mission forward: 75 congregations who are interested in becoming the next Hope Center, 30 congregations who want to partner to start and grow a youth ministry program. 100 congregations who are ready and willing to be the next miracle in the Miracles Everywhere Campaign, 10 congregations ready to invest with the Stewardship Foundation to move us forward into what is next and 10 congregations who are ready to start a new worship experience.

#### Worship

We had powerful worship experiences starting with an ordination service on Sunday night which saw 18 newly commissioned and ordained clergy and one missionary who will serve in Mongolia for the Board of Global Ministries. We celebrated the ministries of 21 clergy who retired representing 549 years in ministry with the people of Greater New Jersey. Bishop Ernest Lyght delivered a powerful sermon for our Service of Remembrance where we honored 28 clergy, clergy spouses, and lay members who passed in the last year.

#### Leadership

GNJ leaders shared the fruits of our ministry and the steps we have taken to fulfill our 2023 Strategic Plan including resources like Leadership 100, the Pathway to Discipleship, the Breakthrough Worship Series, the Clergy Leadership Development Initiative, Clergy Coaching, PaCE groups, Team Vital, the Congregational Leadership Development Initiative and more.

Outside of regular sessions, United Methodists served communion on the beach and boardwalk, meditated in communal prayer at our prayer stations, shared fellowship at one of the group or general meals and packed 30,000 meals for Rise Against Hunger.

GNJ received a generous offering of \$31,281.50 from our congregations for the Miracles Everywhere Campaign which is supporting our partnership with Tanzania and Puerto Rico, Next Generation Ministries and A Future With Hope.

#### **Desegregation of NJ Schools**

Sammy Arroyo, GNJ representative in the NJ Schools Desegregation Coalition, shared an update on the work being done as part of the efforts GNJ initiated last year through a historic lawsuit against the State of New Jersey that calls for the desegregation of public schools in the state. Next steps include a partnership with The Latino Action Network Foundation and the Salvation and Social Justice for program planning, outreach and organizing.

#### **Cultural Competency**

Kristina González, Director of Innovation for an Inclusive Church for the Greater Northwest Episcopal Area of the UMC, led us in a teaching session in cultural competency and the intersections with emotional intelligence to further our commitment to our tenyear cultural competency plan. Small group sharing brought home her message with a hands-on exercise to encourage conversation.

#### The Way Forward

Holy Conferencing took on new meaning Tuesday as the conference discussed the work of The Way Forward Team. Bishop John Schol invited all members of the Way Forward Team to join him in sharing their work, by focusing on the tools of having an outward mindset. David Wherle, the vice chair of the Wesleyan Covenant Association and Amanda Hemenetz, the chair of Reconciling Ministries, both gave witness to how the team is lifting them up and giving them hope for a way forward. Members of the body stepped to the microphones to share where they saw themselves in the boxes that kept us inward and where in our lives we experienced outward ministries.

The conferencing concluded at the table that Jesus set for us. We held communion as Bishop Schol proclaimed the mystery of our faith and the fragility of all of us in this liminal time.



DATE: Sunday, June 9


