

### A Note From the Pastor



"As long as the earth endures, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night will never cease."

- Genesis 8:22

#### "Seedtime and Harvest: A New Season for Our Church"

Dear Beloved Church Family,

Just the other night, we saw the first signs of summer fireflies in our backyard. One of my favorite summertime childhood memories was catching fireflies with my sister Susan in our grandparents' backyard. My sister and I would create lovely little habitats for the fireflies with leaves and sticks inside a mason jar. We'd cover the top with saran wrap and a rubber band and poke holes in it so they could breathe. I vividly remember running around the backyard laughing and giggling and shouting "I got one!" as the other sister ran over to help with the mason jar. We would watch them for hours, and just as their glows started to fade inside the jar, we would decide it was time to let them go.

Recently, I read an article on how fireflies are dwindling in population here in New Jersey and folks are starting to notice they don't see as many fireflies as perhaps we used to.

Can you imagine a summer without fireflies?

Also recently, I read an article on how church attendance is dwindling here in America. Indeed, the Pew Research Center reports that 40% of U.S. adults say they attend religious services less often today than they did as children. 32% of U.S. adults say organized religion is less important to them today than it was to their families when they were growing up. There has been a significant decline in church attendance since the turn of the 21st century. For a bit, mainline Protestant denominations were losing members at alarming rates, while the conservative evangelical traditions grew or at least maintained their numbers. For instance, between 2000 and 2015, the Presbyterian Church USA, the Episcopal Church, and the United Church of Christ lost 40% of their members. In contrast, Protestant Evangelical churches and denominations saw a slight increase during the first decade of the 21st century. Now that is no longer the case. Reporting of church attendance by denominations and traditions of ALL stripes shows the lowest attendance rates ever seen in America's history. (www.churchtrac.com)

Can you imagine a church without people?

As I reflect on the words of Genesis 8:22, I am reminded that God has promised us rhythms and seasons — not just in nature, but in life and in the life of the Church. This verse speaks to the enduring faithfulness of God even as change and loss inevitably come. And now, we find ourselves in the midst of such a change — one that brings both grief and great hope.

After much prayer, discernment, and conversation, our church has made the faithful decision to repurpose our education building into affordable housing for senior citizens. This is a

significant change, and I know it brings a mix of emotions. The Reeves Education building holds memories of Sunday school classes, the Wesley Center, fellowship events, and decades of ministry. Letting go of its original purpose is not easy. But friends, as the seasons shift, so too must we — if we are to be good stewards of what God has entrusted to us. Like holding onto the memories of fireflies lighting the summer night skies, we now acknowledge that times have changed and we cherish those lasting reminders of what once was.

A few folks have shared with me that they don't fully understand how we got here. Let me assure you, these conversations have been going on within our Board of Trustees, Administrative Council, and Finance Committee meetings for quite some time. Unfortunately, events over the past ten years have exasperated the situation. This decision comes after many years of financial strain within the church. We have lost many faithful donors to death and relocation. The COVID-19 pandemic deeply affected our attendance and giving, and though we have remained faithful in ministry, the financial impact has been undeniable. In the Fall of 2022, the Administrative Council and Board of Trustees were considering bringing a preschool back into the Education building as a viable option. Unfortunately, that winter, one of our boilers failed. As a result, in the Spring of 2023, the Board of Trustees hired an architectural firm to do a survey of the entire church property and we found that replacing our aging HVAC system is beyond our current means. The architectural survey also revealed repair needs so extensive, we simply cannot afford to maintain our buildings as they stand.

From that architectural survey, we learned our steeple and bell tower were so unsafe that they could crumble at any moment. Large amounts of disturbed asbestos were found in the basement as well as dangerous black mold in various areas. Obviously, these items needed to be tended to immediately and, altogether, cost the church over \$60,000 from the Endowment fund. These were just three of the many, many repairs needed to bring our property to safe and compliant conditions.

I'd like to invite anyone in the congregation who is interested in checking out the architectural survey to come into the church office, Monday-Friday, from 9am-1pm and sign-out the book to be read in the Conference Room or Fellowship Room; the book cannot leave church property. I promise if you have any questions, this detailed survey will shed an incredible amount of light on how dire the situation really is. Also included later on in this newsletter is an update from our Finance Committee that details our deficit dating back 25 years. I hope and pray this also helps to shed some light with some real-time data on how we got here.

The board of Trustees and Administrative Council have come to the difficult realization that despite our best efforts, the combination of the deterioration of our massive property, coupled with our financial challenges, threatens the church's ability to continue operating. In order to remain viable and fulfill God's mission, the Board of Trustees and Administrative Council had to consider several difficult options:

- 1. **Selling the Education Building and 1910 Social Hall/Green Room** This action would help alleviate immediate financial pressures; however, it would involve giving up a large portion of the church's physical space used for current mission and ministries, as well as alter the church's ability to continue offering worship services, events, and programming relevant to the community and continued growth.
- 2. **Starting the Process of Closing or Merging the Church** While this is an option the church deeply wishes to avoid, it may become necessary if other solutions are not viable within the next five years.
- 3. **Repurposing Part of the Property into Affordable Housing for Seniors** This option would involve transforming the Education Building and part of the 1910 building into affordable housing for seniors, allowing the church to generate income to sustain its ministry operations while continuing to serve the community in a new and impactful way.

To be frank: our church leadership discerned that we cannot sustain ourselves financially unless we take bold, faithful action.

Today, July 1<sup>st</sup>, 2025, I officially begin my fifth year as your appointed pastor. I am so thankful to God and all of you to have had such a journey thus far. And, as your faithful preacher in residence, it is my duty to bring the Good News. This is not a story of decline — this is a story of resurrection. This is a story of seedtime and harvest. This is a testimony of recognizing and relishing in the beautiful glow of the strength of the fireflies that are still here - we will not let God's light fade! God is doing something new! By converting our Education Building into affordable senior housing, we are planting something new in our community. We are choosing to serve. We are stepping into a new season of mission and ministry — one where we become a home and a haven for older adults, God's children, in need.

This new mission will transform lives — including ours. It will connect us more deeply to the needs of our neighbors. It will bring new relationships, new ministry opportunities, and a renewed sense of purpose. We are not losing a building; we are gaining a calling.

Just as the seasons change — summer to fall, seedtime to harvest — so too is God guiding us through transformation. And through it all, God's faithfulness endures.

Let us walk together into this new season with courage, gratitude, and hope.

  - Isabel Reyes, Northeastern University




Another highlight of the day was celebrating the confirmation of **Malik Hall**, who affirmed his faith and was welcomed as a full member of the church.

First Sunday of Each Month | 5:30 PM | Summit United Methodist Church



Please join us on the first Sunday of every month in the UMC Chapel located on Deforest Avenue.





### **Updates from the UMC Summit Finance Committee**



#### Dear UMC Summit Family,

As we continue to grow together in faith and community, we want to share an honest update about our church's financial situation. Transparency strengthens our bond and helps us move forward together with purpose and hope.

#### Where We Stand Today

Our church currently faces a significant financial challenge. In 2024, our expenses exceeded our income by over \$200,000. To put this in perspective, ten years ago our annual deficit was typically between \$50,000-\$100,000. We've been covering this gap by drawing from our endowment fund, but at current levels, this approach is no longer sustainable.

#### **How We Got Here**

The Primary Challenge: Declining Donations The biggest factor has been a steady decrease in pledges and regular donations over the past 25 years. In the early 2000s, we received \$250,000-\$300,000 annually in pledges and donations. Today, that figure has dropped to \$150,000-\$180,000. This decline is primarily due to the natural attrition of donors through moves, deaths, and life changes—a challenge many churches face.

**Rising Expenses** While our expenses remained relatively stable for many years, recent increases in insurance, conference fees, and other operational costs have added pressure. Insurance costs alone have increased by \$20,000 compared to ten-year averages.

The COVID Impact The period from 2020-2021 marked a turning point. The combination of

decreased revenue and increased expenses during this time created a deficit from which we haven't fully recovered.

#### **Our Path Forward: The Affordable Housing Project**

We're not simply hoping for the best—we're taking concrete action. The proposed affordable housing project represents a significant step toward financial stability. This initiative is projected to:

- Generate approximately \$65,000 in additional annual revenue
- Reduce our operating expenses by relieving us of significant costs related to the education building
- Improve efficiency through updated HVAC infrastructure
- Combined impact: Reduce our deficit by \$80,000-\$90,000 annually

#### **What This Means**

While the affordable housing project won't solve all our financial challenges, it will put us on much stronger footing. We'll still need to continue building our revenue through increased giving, new members, and creative ministry opportunities.

#### **Moving Forward Together**

This financial challenge is real, but so is our faith and our commitment to this beloved community. We're sharing this information because you deserve to know where we stand, and because together, we can write the next chapter of UMC Summit's story. We invite you to:

- Pray for wisdom and guidance as we navigate these decisions
- Consider how you might support our mission through giving
- Share your thoughts and questions with the leadership team
- Trust that God continues to work through this community

Your Finance Committee and leadership team are working diligently to ensure our church not only survives but thrives for generations to come.


